- (1) Through his mother Isabella of Portugal Philip II was the grandson of Manuel I, king of Portugal from 1495-1521. Dom Antonio, Prior of Crato, was a bastard son of Prince Luis, the second son of King Manuel I. Dom Antonio's claim was supported by both France and England. The union of the then two biggest colonial powers considerably disturbed the balance of power. This may partly explain the prolonged negotations for the marriage of Queen Elizabeth and the Duke d'Anjou, which, finally, came to nothing.
- (2) The Jesuit Mission was definitively crushed after the Gunpowder Plot in November 1605.
- (3) Their wild accusations remained without any consequences for Oxford.
- Subscribers of this bond were "binding themselves under a vow and promise before the Majesty of Almighty God, ... faithfully to serve and obey the Queen, and to defend her against all Estates, Dignities, and earthly Powers whatsoever, and to pursue to utter extermination all that shall attempt by any act, counsel, or consent to anything that shall tend to the harm of Her Majesty's Royal Person, or claim succession to the Crown by the untimely death of Her Majesty; vowing and protesting in the presence of the Eternal and Everliving God to prosecute such persons to the death."
- (5) Another hint to the thesis that Shakespeare has given the character of Polonius more than one trait of Burghley. Because of his zeal for the introduction of an additional fish day, a device probably also intended to promote shipbuilding, Lord Burghley may be called "a fishmonger". This is what Hamlet, feigning madness, took Polonius for in II.2.173-4: Polonius: Do you know me, my lord? Hamlet: Excellently well. You are a fishmonger."
